Re: COMPLAINT – GOVERNMENT ABUSE, DEPRIVATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS, TORTURE (U.S.C. TITLE 18, § 2340) (ARTICLE 3 & 5 UDHR)

Dear Teresa McHenry,

On August 3, 2011, I filed a Complaint with the Human Rights and Special Prosecutions Section (see attached document). As of today (5 weeks later), I have not been contacted by a representative from your office to investigate my allegation of government abuse and torture. I am now unemployed and unable to work due to my injuries inflicted by these public officials.

I will also require the services of a Victims Specialist to accommodate my needs as a result of my injuries. I am both surprised and disappointed that the Federal Government does not take abuse and torture seriously when conducted by or instigated with the consent of public officials.

Abuse and Torture is a very serious Human Rights offences; not only when inflicted on prisoners of war or terrorists, but especially when inflicted on innocent civilians for their own personal gain. The government's remedy to addressing torture or any serious crime by public officials is to **"do nothing"**, stall and hope the problem will just go away if they ignore the issue long enough.

Government abuse, torture, and corruption has gone ramped in this country, simply because the laws to protect the citizens Civil and Human Rights are not effectively enforced against the offenders. These corrupt officials believe that anything they can get away with has become legalized. If they receive no repercussion from their offense, they deem it comes with their authority and power and therefore legal.

Our government doesn't want any harm to come to their friends and colleagues (the good ole boys) but they never consider the harm to the victims as a result of the criminal misdeeds by public officials. This is what our Constitution of the United States and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights is for "to protect citizens from government abuse"
