Re: Government Abuse, Deprivation of Fundamental Freedoms and Human Rights, Torture –
Title 18, U.S.C., Section 2340, Right to Life, Liberty, Personal Security, Freedom from Torture
and Degrading Treatment.

Dear Special Agent in Charge Edward Hanko,

Whereas disregard and contempt for human rights have resulted in barbarous acts which have outraged the conscience of mankind, and deprived my rights protect under the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the Constitution of the United States, I have filed this complaint for redress to restore and proclaim certain inherent rights and my right to the enjoyment of life and liberty, with the means of acquiring and possessing property, and pursuing and obtaining happiness and safety.

United States Code: Title 18, § 2340. Torture

1. “torture” means an act committed by a person acting under the color of law specifically intended to inflict severe physical or mental pain or suffering (other than pain or suffering incidental to lawful sanctions) upon another person within his custody or physical control;
2. “severe mental pain or suffering” means the prolonged mental harm caused by or resulting from—
 - a. the intentional infliction or threatened infliction of severe physical pain or suffering;
 - b. the administration or application, or threatened administration or application, of mind-altering substances or other procedures calculated to disrupt profoundly the senses or the personality; the threat of imminent death; or

- c. the threat that another person will imminently be subjected to death, severe physical pain or suffering, or the administration or application of mind-altering substances or other procedures calculated to disrupt profoundly the senses or personality; and
3. "United States" means the several States of the United States, the District of Columbia, and the commonwealths, territories, and possessions of the United States.

Definitions:

Torture, according to the United Nations Convention Against Torture is:

...any act by which severe pain or suffering, whether physical or mental, is intentionally inflicted on a person for such purposes as obtaining from him, or a third person, information or a confession, punishing him for an act he or a third person has committed or is suspected of having committed, or intimidating or coercing him or a third person, or for any reason based on discrimination of any kind, when such pain or suffering is inflicted by or at the instigation of or with the consent or acquiescence of a public official or other person acting in an official capacity.

Human Rights, are defined as basic rights and freedoms to which all humans are entitled such as civil and political rights, the right to life and liberty, freedom of thought and expression, equality before the law, social, cultural and economic rights, including the right to participate in culture, the right to food, the right to work, and the right to education.

Natural rights, also called **inalienable rights**, are considered to be self-evident and universal. They are not contingent upon the laws, customs, or beliefs of any particular culture or government.

Legal rights, such as constitutional rights, common law rights, and statutory rights, are bestowed under a particular political and legal system; they are relative to specific cultures and governments.

When ratifying the treaty the United States added a reservation that the definition of "cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment" meant "the cruel, unusual and inhumane treatment or punishment prohibited by the Fifth, Eighth, and/or Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States".

Torture is prohibited under international law and the domestic laws. It is considered to be a violation of human rights, and is declared to be unacceptable by Article 5 of the UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Branches, Agencies, Jurisdiction, Authority, and Officers of the of the State of Ohio Government (hereinafter called the "State Government")

For an act to constitute “torture” it must satisfy each of the following five elements in the definition of torture; all five acts have been satisfied to constitute act/acts of torture:

- (1) The act must cause severe physical or mental pain or suffering;
 - a. The act/acts caused severe physical and mental pain and suffering.
 - b. The act/acts caused significant impairment in social and occupational functioning.
- (2) The act must be intentionally inflicted;
 - a. The act/acts were preplanned, scripted and conspired; an assault with the intentions of harming, disabling and depriving the victim.
- (3) The act must be inflicted for a proscribed purpose;
 - a. The act/acts were for the purpose of depriving the victim of his natural and legal rights in violation of both national and international law.
 - b. The act/acts were for the purpose of intimidation, coercion, oppression, submission, and retaliation.
- (4) The act must be inflicted by (or at the instigation of or with the consent or acquiescence of) a public official who has custody of the victim; and
 - a. The act/acts were inflicted, instigated, and acquiescence by public official(s) under Color of Law of the state government while under the protection of the state government.
- (5) The act cannot arise from lawful sanctions.
 - a. The act/acts did not arise from any lawful sanctions.
 - b. The act/acts were prohibited under international law and the domestic laws.
 - c. The act/acts were inflicted under no legal or moral basis and in violation of human rights law, the Constitution and laws of the United States.
